EDITORIAL

The Tidy Towns results. (See page 8)

The results of the National Tidy Towns Competition were announced at the Helix in D.C.U. on the afternoon of 26th September. Four representatives were invited from each of the towns and villages participating across the country, a total of 859 centres. There was an increase of 39 centres on last year.

The results for Clane are given on page 8, followed by the adjudicator's comments. The date of inspection was 8th July. In brief, we advanced 4 points on last year and retained our Bronze Medal with €400. We now have 299 points. Clane are still leaders of Category E (5,001-10,000) in Kildare, ahead of Athy (278 points), Kildcock (264 points) and Kildare (263 points).

2016 completes 43 years of participation by Clane Community Council in the National Tidy Towns Competition, having commenced in 1973, and the Tidy Towns Committee being a Sub-committee of the Community Council. That point having been made, it must be said that a number of really committed members focus their commitment to community participation principally on Tidy Towns. Clane has been involved in Tidy Towns going back into the 60s when the I.C.A. started the ball rolling.

It is encouraging to see the commitment and enthusiasm for Tidy Towns continuing and gaining momentum as it goes. This is re-

flected in the positive comments and appreciation of the judges. The quality of life is strongly tied in with the quality of the environment. Nothing pulls society down more than a slum environment, while the good environment stimulates and uplifts. Every input and idea is very welcome.

Community Involvement & Planning / Rannpháirtíocht an Phobail & Pleanáil:

We welcome Clane to Tidy Towns competition 2016. As always, it was a joy to visit your vibrant town for the first time. You operate under the auspices of Clane Community Council. You have made great strides in the competition in recent years and we congratulate you on your achievements. Your clearly presented entry form made our adjudication job easier. The map with numbered projects was most helpful – perhaps you could list the numbered projects near the map so that we can see what is what without searching the entry form for each item. Your application also includes your updated Tidy Towns Plan 2014-2018. This is obviously giving you an organised and structured approach to dealing with further improvements to Clane. The adjudicator wouldn't be looking to your Plan for recent or ongoing achievements so do make sure anything under this heading is in your main entry form. Your public relations campaign is keeping your message out there in the community. Your active committee of 16 members has the support of about 10 volunteers

to help out for specific tasks. Your Tus Scheme is of valuable assistance also. You have strong links with outside agencies such as Kildare County Council and National Parks & Wildlife Service. Your Schools Officer is ensuring that schools and youth groups are being encouraged to work with you on projects. You also enjoy the support of your local clubs and businesses.

Built Environment and Streetscape / An Timpallacht Thógtha agus Sráid-dreacha:

The Abbey is a stunning focal point to the town – the new signage makes the whole area more inviting. You are working hard to highlight your history and built heritage in an appropriate manner. You are fortunate to have the assistance of your Local History Group to assist in this regard. We are glad to hear that residents are closely engaging in the consultation process for the Clane Local Area Plan – many elements will tie in with Tidy Towns categories. Clane has some attractive shopfronts – your ‘Best Presented Premises’ Award is a good way of encouraging businesses to paint shopfronts and tidy up facades. It is good to hear that there has been a recent reduction in the number of unoccupied premises. Your engagement, follow-up and lobbying will have a positive effect with regard to your derelict properties. Do please keep us updated. Lidl was neat with good landscaping. The Parade Ring Pub looked very well - could the derelict house across the way be painted? We admired the ‘pop-up (?)’ Jones Bar with its lovely traditional shopfront. Other shopfronts we admired included Tom Gough & Sons and P Wallace. Both Londis and B&K Gift & Home were neat. The proprietors of Jaz Manzor’s are commended for the excellence of both the building and landscaped car park. The KARE building is fresh with some colourful hanging baskets. Both Clane Jewellers and DNG were nicely presented. All was in good order at the Village Centre and St. Brigid’s N.S. (Old Convent School)

Landscaping and Open Spaces / Tírdhreachú agus Spásanna Oscailte:

The Abbey Community Centre is a real gem – you are right to have opened up the view here. The church grounds are nicely landscaped. The roadside planting in front of Hickeys (Centra) was admired. Clane has some small but attractive green areas such as that in front of the Abbey and opposite around the playground. Recent work to revamp the long bed at the latter area (alongside the Stream) is noted. Your efforts to choose low maintenance and insect friendly perennials are lauded. Use of bark mulch holds in the moisture for longer. Maintenance of your attractive roundabouts is kindly sponsored by local businesses. You have also planted wildlife-friendly hedging between Alexandra Manor and the Nature Park. Your unsuccessful beech hedge (green area beside St. Brigid’s Terrace) was replaced in recent months. Ongoing planting of native trees is a worthwhile investment for the future. Giving a ‘tree for every baptism’ is a lovely gesture. Planters are well maintained and bring a splash of colour to key locations.

Wildlife, Habitats and Natural Amenities / Fíadhúlra, Gnáthóga agus Taitneamhachtaí Nádúrtha:

Recent habitat mapping in preparation for the Clane Local Area Plan was carried out by Kildare Co Co, with the local knowledge supplied by Tidy Towns. Your popular ‘Wild About Clane’ walks provide awareness raising as well as a social occasion for the community to get together. Signage at the Nature Park is somewhat hidden by branches so some attention is required here. Your efforts to sensitively conserve the Nancy’s Lane area are commended. Your engagement with local schools on local biodiversity topics is also worthwhile – do let us know if schools are working on this flag and if you are partnering with them on a project. You have received expert advice in relation to attracting swifts to the Abbey Tower – do let us know of any success here. There is lots of local interest in constructing, installing and monitoring your nest boxes. We are impressed with the fact that you have your own beehives in the community and that you have been recently expanding this project. We note that you are keeping on top of your Himalayan Balsam through your summertime hand-removal. Well done. Ongoing bat monitoring is noted.

Sustainable Waste and Resource Management / Bainistiú Acmhainní agus Dramhaíola Inbhuanaithe:

Well done to the businesses that have succeeded in practically ridding Clane of plastic-bags. The schools are also commended for their efforts to reduce waste, water and energy – particularly Scoil Phadraig, where recently installed green flush system has significantly reduced the amount of water used for this purposes. Your Tidy Towns green waste is used locally as mulch. Other landscaping items are reused where possible. You are on the right track with this category. Visit www.localprevention.ie/tidytowns to see what initiatives other groups are implementing around the country. There may be an idea you could replicate in Clane. We look forward to hearing of further progress next year.

Tidiness and Litter Control / Slachtmhaireacht agus Rialú Bruscair:

Litter control was good in your busy town so well done to all involved. Your daily litter patrols and periodic larger scale clean ups are paying dividends. The approach roads are also part of your voluntary programme. School groups and clubs are happy to play their part in making their community cleaner and more attractive. Your awareness campaign in relation to dog fouling is noted as are your efforts to segregate your litter for recycling. Well done to all involved. There were a few instances of minor littering.

Generally Clane presents a very tidy appearance and air of pride about it. Attention to detail in the ‘tidiness’ category is noted in areas of clutter, in appropriate signage, redundant poles and graffiti. Weed control was generally good. The area to the side of Centra

could be screened off. Wire clutter at the NCB shop should be examined. Hughes Pharmacy has a neat appearance. A 'stop' sign near Jas Manzor's is bent.

Residential Streets & Housing Areas / Sráideanna Cónaithe & Ceantair Tithíochta:

Well done for your ongoing encouragement of your residents groups. Your Annual Best Kept Estates Competition is helping to strengthen participation and pride of place. Well done to the businesses who lend their support to this important initiative. Recent landscaping, clean ups and general improvements in residential areas are making Clane a more attractive place to live. We noted neat homes and gardens along approaches. Residential areas are maintained to a high standard. Flower displays at Abbey Park give a sense of pride. There is scope for more tree planting along the inside of the front boundary wall. We got lost in the large but neat Alexandra Walk – the riverside walkway is a fantastic amenity to have running along this stretch – we hope it is appreciated and used by residents.

Approach Roads, Streets & Lanes / Bóithre Isteach, Sráideanna & Lánaí:

You have done some good work under this category. Recent work on footpaths and road surfacing is noted. Tree planting and other landscaping will further enhance your approaches. The boundary wall at the Country Market needs repair. Road surfaces and footpaths were in good order. You are conscious to minimise signage clutter on your approach roads, in order to create a tidier impression. The hedge on the Sallins Rd is doing well. The new hedge planting to the rear of Alexandra Park was noted. We thought your lovely walks could be highlighted a bit more.

Concluding Remarks:

We are glad to hear that Tidy Towns has increased community spirit and participation for the benefit of all in Clane. Keep up the good work.

CLANE LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

A talk on "The Archaeology of the Franciscan Friary Clane" will be given by the renowned archaeologist Noel Dunne, who commissioned a geophysical survey of the Friary site on behalf of Kildare Co. Council in July 2015. Clane Local History Group are delighted that Noel has agreed to present the main findings from this report and their relationship to the remaining structures on the site.

The meeting will be held in our usual venue of the GAA premises on Prosperous Road on Wednesday October 19 at 8pm and was originally scheduled as the Group's contribution to Heritage Week in August this year. However, on that occasion the bad weather forced the cancellation of the out-door event.
