The most common suggestion in response to Clane Community Council's earlier Ideas for Clane mailshot was for Christmas lights. It is not an easy subject with a past that has seen several failures despite a lot of hard work by several different organisations. However, we had a subcommittee look at the suggestion and come up with a plan. Once we gave go- ahead we were thrilled with the support it elicited. The kick-off was a table quiz, organised by Councillor Padraig McEvoy, which €1500. After that our litraised tle team of "collectors" had no problem in getting the donations of €50 to €100 we looked for from businesses and individuals. I must, though, single out some for the very generous nature of their donations. These were Kildare County Council, Councillor Padraig McEvoy, Clane Project Centre, Power Food Technology, Cullen Cleaning, Condron's Supervalu and Aldi. Their substantial donations were vital in getting the project off the ground. However, the words of the sign in the vilnotice board afterwards summed up what was a wonderful community-wide effort:

Clane Community Council would like to thank all the individuals and businesses that contributed to the Clane Christmas lights. The scheme includes 500m of lights, 2,000 cable ties, 130 volunteer hours, local fundraising, 55 premises.... and 1 community."

Thanks to everyone involved, not just those who donated but those who gave so generously of their time in planning, purchasing and putting up the lights and in collecting the money. It was a huge voluntary effort all-round that Clane can be proud of and one that we will build on in the years to come.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL AGM 30th January 2017

Secretary's Report

Introduction:

The 42nd AGM of Clane Community Council was held on Monday 25th January 2016 in the Abbey at 8pm.

Des Drumm was nominated and se-

conded on the night and elected as Chairman for 2016 and a new council executive formed. We also welcomed a new member to the executive – Martine Grogan. The new executive formed was as follows;

The community council held 9 monthly council meetings over two periods between February – June and between September – December. In addition to the monthly meetings the community council officers attended 3 executive meetings held in March, August and December. Our subcommittees continued to be active throughout the year.

2016 proved to be another busy year for the Community Council I have highlighted just some of the activities undertaken by the community council or though one of the subcommittees. In summary these are as follows:

Saint Patricks Day Parade - 2016

In March the community council entered the Clane Saint Patricks Day Parade with a people powered Pedibus that was sponsored by Power Food Technology. The float was awarded 2nd prize for non-commercial floats by the organising judges.

Tidy Towns:

2016 completes 43 years of participation by Clane Community Council in the National Tidy Towns Competition having commenced in 1973. 2016 was another busy & successful year culminated in Clane retaining our bronze medal after being awarded an additional 4 points onto our 2015 tally to achieve a total of 299 points out of a possible 450. Clane are still leaders of Category E in Kildare, ahead of Athy (278 points), Kilcock (264 points) and Kildare Town (263 points). Category E are places with a population of between 5,001 – 10,000.

A big thanks to all of the community council members, residents' associations, businesses, schools, sports clubs and other volunteers who supported this year's events so enthusiastically.

It is encouraging to see the achievements year on year and this sub-committee deserves full credit for their work throughout 2016.

There were a total of 450 marks available under a wide range of categories including:

- Community Involvement & Planning
- Built Environment and Streetscape
- Landscaping and Open Spaces
- Wildlife, Habitats and Natural Amenities
- Sustainable Waste and Resource Management
- Tidiness and Litter Control
- Residential Streets & Housing Areas
 Approach Roads, Streets & Lanes
 The judges included many positive

comments under each heading and areas that the Tidy Towns sub-committee can focus on in 2017. Their concluding remarks were:

We are glad to hear that Tidy Towns has increased community spirit and participation for the benefit of all in Clane. Keep up the good work.

The achievements of local resident's associations and businesses were all recognised at the annual Community Awards Night held in The Village Inn on Friday 11th November. The winners of the 2016 Clane Tidy Towns Best Kept Estates and Best Presented Premises competitions were announced.

One issue that continues to be a problem for which we saw a reoccurrence during 2016 was Graffiti. As a community council we need to be alert to this antisocial behaviour and ensure areas that are targeted are cleaned up and the Graffiti removed as soon as possible.

Community Games:

A successful Church gate collection was held in early May which resulted in approx. €570 being collected.

The local games were once again held in Scoil Mhuire on 16th May and a big thank you must go to Scoil Mhuire for the use of their facilities. This sub-committee has looked at ways of promoting & communicating the community games events and have set up a Facebook page. The county games were held in Clongowes Wood College on 29th and 30th June. Clane & Rathcoffey participated on the night and had some successes to report.

The Gaelic football team won a silver medal in the county finals and the

hurling & camogie teams both won their county finals.

In addition Matthew Walsh-Hussey won individual medal in swimming in the national finals.

Congratulations to this sub-committee for their continued work at local level ensuring that we always have community games representatives from Clane & Rathcoffey at the county games. Martina Healy coordinates all Clane & Rathcoffey Community Games activities. Also a big thank you to Susan Galbraith who looks after the swimmers.

Heritage Sub-Committee:

The Heritage sub-committee also continued to be active throughout 2016. Work is ongoing and required to erect all remaining plaques and signs. Other projects have been identified and discussions are ongoing on landscaping the 1798 memorial as a Tidy Town's project. The photographic survey of the Abbey Garden graves will be finalised this coming year. A grant application has been made to Kildare County Council Heritage Scheme to part fund design of replacement of the Sunday's Well. A detailed heritage consultant's report was issued in 2016 in respect of the Sunday's Well.

Friary & Abbey Graveyard:

The AGM of the Friary & Abbey graveyard committee was held in March. The graveyard continues to be kept to a very high standard and credit must go to this subcommittee and their selected band of volunteers.

The annual cemetery mass was held on the 14^{th} June.

Finance:

To avoid any duplication with either the Chairman's or Treasurers report I will not go into much detail under this heading. 10

However our current level of funds and fundraising limits the amount of work that we can undertake.

We have a building that needs annual maintenance and I feel this is one of the main subjects that the new executive will need to address in 2017. I believe we need to invest in the Abbey year on year and we will need to look at what mechanism can be put in place to allow this regular funding to be available to carry out projects both on a short and long term basis.

The main community council fund raising activity in 2016 was the annual golf classic. This was once again kindly sponsored by Larchfield Nursing Home. Thank you to Nellie Dillon of Larchfield Nursing home and to Des Drumm and his organising committee. The weather on the day was not great but a big thank you to all of our other sponsors and the teams that participated.

Abbey Hall & Remembrance Gardens:

The Tus worker programme continued through 2016 and as a community council we continued to benefit from having these workers employed not just in the Abbey but on the many other tasks that they carry out in the Remembrance Garden and around the village overall maintaining the landscaping, cutting grass etc.

One of the main items tackled in the Abbey last year was to commence the removal of the numerous timber structures, stages and crawl spaces to the rear of the stage in the Aspe area. These works were commenced and while not fully completed already better access & egress to the rear of the main stage exists. We have met with CMDS on 2 or 3 occasions throughout last year to agree these works. We have a plan in place to complete the removal of the front of the existing stage and complete the rest of the works in the Aspe area by the end of

March 2017.

We have a number of other items that we will be addressing during 2017.

CCC - Web Site:

I reported last year that our web site is a credit to the community council. It is kept current and up to date with the latest calendar events, community council activities, articles, and latest editions of Le Cheile to name just a few. The Le Cheile community magazine made the transition from paper to the electronic version successfully in Feb. 2014 and was published/ 30 times electronically since. A big thank you to Tony McEvoy & John Kennedy and everyone else involved in this sub-committee.

<u>Christmas 'Lights-On' & Claonadh</u> Award 2016:

The wonderful and now annual awards night was held in the Abbey Hall on 4th December. Clane Parish Choir set the scene with some lovely carols and this year's winner of the Claonadh Award Susan Galbraith was revealed. Susan was a worthy winner of the award and has already commenced work with this year's community games swimming competition that was held in Naas last Saturday 28th January 2017.

One of the initiatives spearheaded by Des Drumm back in November 2015 was the 'Ideas for Clane'. This resulted in some very interesting ideas and proposals being made. However one idea above all stood out and was repeated by numerous people was the idea for Christmas lights in Clane.

The community council reacted to this and a small subcommittee & volunteer group was formed. At very short notice some fund raising activities were successfully arranged together with some generous donations and support of the local businesses Clane was transformed in December. This was a spectacular success of what one community can achieve in such a short time frame. In addition a new star was placed on top of the Abbey and new lights were bought for our Christmas tree on the green. Thank you to everyone involved

In conclusion I hope I have captured the main activities & events of the community council over the past year. It is not always possible to mention everything so if I have omitted anything apologies. I believe as a community council our structures are in place and are solid. I would encourage all sub-committees to meet at least once during the coming year. It does make a difference. Generally the subcommittees are working however certain challenges do lay ahead for us in 2017 in respect of funding and the upkeep of the Abbey Hall.

Finally this is my last report as Secretary as I have held the role for the last 3 years I would like to thank Des Drumm as Chairman, my fellow officers, the community council members & volunteers for all their help, advice and assistance throughout 2016. I know that 2017 will continue to be a successful year for the community council and look forward to working with you all.
