FIELD FARE

[Taken from Le Chéile February 1989 with some adjustments and extensions]

I wonder how many children nowadays would know what "dark lukers" are? When the writer was in primary school, hunting in ponds and quarries for those fascinating creatures was seasonal around this time of the year. Like their cousins, the frogs, they hibernate in water. For those who don't know, a 'dark luker' never saw it spelt) is a creature not unlike a lizard, with which it is often confused. It is a muddy brown in colour and about three to four inches long. It has four legs and a long tail. Unlike the lizard it has no scales, but its body is covered rather by a moist soft skin. The dark luker is an amphibian like the frog and the toad. It hibernates in water and in summer it moves out on dry land. It is difficult to see them in the murky dark water of a pond. They are frequently seen on the bogs, taking refuge in deep cracks. They are adept at matching their colour to their background, and in summer they assume various shades of yellow and have red and black spots.

Their name in Irish is 'earc luachra' or beast of the ashes. A German friend tells me that that in her country there is an important tradition of warning children not to lie down on the ground to take a rest as you may fall asleep with your mouth open and they may walk in and go down your throat with dire consequences.

I remember well catching four specimens of lukers in a pond which used be located where the Big Green in Loughbollard is now situated. This was many years before Loughbollard Estate was built and I was going to the Christian Brothers Secondary School in Naas at the time. I

had the creatures in a jam pot on the kitchen window above the sink. They used to stand up on their back legs and wave to and fro. My mother appears not to have liked the sight of them and so one day she threw them out on the far side of the yard. That night my father was sitting alone beside the fire reading the paper. All was quiet, when his attention was drawn to some sound or movement in the space under the kitchen door. In walked the four 'lukers' in a line having negotiated the yard and come under two doors. He stared at them in wonder as they steadily crossed the floor towards the fire. When the first one reached the ashes he went in without hesitation, followed in turn by each of the other three. They were never seen again. We were all equally amazed when we came home to hear the bizarre story recounted.

By one of these strange coincidences, of which life is full, about a week later, our Irish teacher was reading from a book called 'Ceacht as Leabhar na Cruinne' when he came to an expression "Faigheann na neairc luachra an tine" (the luckers seek the fire). His honest comment was that he could never understand what meant by this statement). I found myself in the most unusual position of being able to relate the story of a very unique and appropriate experience. Years later I read somewhere else that frogs and newts, being cold-blooded, only become properly active when they sit out in the sun to raise their body temperatures and that newts follow a heat gradient and are powerless to turn back in their passage from colder to warmer locations. This is so highly developed and sensitive a faculty that the warmth of the breath could well act as an adequate stimulus. To cap it all, a Kerry man, whose knowledge of Irish and folklore is second to none, has told me that in Kerry there is a tradition that if you hold the 'dark luker' by the tail and place him on your tongue you will have a cure for burns.

FOUNTAIN OF KNOWLEDGE

In an article published in the Leinster Leader on 25th November 1989 about Baptismal or Holy Water Fonts in Kildare, mention was made of one in Clane and it was said that little was known of its origin. I can tell you something about it.

I was with Rev. Fr. Kehoe, P.P. when he bought it at a public auction in Donadea Castle, sometime after the last of the Aylmer family died there around 1936/7. It stood in the grounds outside the main door of the Castle and was listed in the programme as a Bird Bath. Fr. Kehoe said it was originally a Holy Water font, that Donadea Castle and the

grounds were in Catholic hands at one time.

It is oval in shape and the date on the base reads 1625. Fr. Kehoe had it erected outside the front door of the church in Clane, filled it with water and blessed it. It remained there until 1973/4, when due to some repairs to the yard with tarmacadam, it was moved over to the right on the Convent side, where it now stands. Fr. Kehoe came to Clane from Portarlington in 1926 and died in 1948, R.I.P. He is buried in the Abbey
